



TOO MUCH INFORMATION!

There is a common expression: “Too much information!” We usually use it when people tell us details about their lives that we don’t want or need to know. Today, when James and John ask Jesus a simple question, making their request for places of honor in the kingdom, a simple answer might have been in order. Instead, as he often does, Jesus answers a question with a question; today it’s about drinking the cup of suffering. Then, once the others are indignant over James and John’s outrageous request, he proceeds to give them what may have been “too much information” for followers who were simply interested in the pursuit of glory. But this information, though it can sometimes seem “too much” for us, is essential for our lives as disciples. In Isaiah, in Hebrews, and in Mark today, we learn this information: it is in suffering, in weakness, in self-giving service to others, that we come to understand the kingdom. It is the information we need to find our place and come to be honored in the reign of God.



Over the past three years our parish council, our finance council and Church leadership have been working on a mission statement that best represents the prayers and wishes of all parishioners.

We recognize that some have left the Church, others have been pushed away, and some were plain hurt through parish life. Our mission is a strong effort to bring healing and forgiveness in the name of Jesus.

I would like to draw your attention to our various ministries. Maybe there are needs we are not serving. Please talk to us at our ministry faire. We will have an Open Forum for the parish in November. Our Religious Education program has over 300 young people. Teachers and volunteers are needed on Sunday mornings and Thursday evenings (especially bi-lingual teachers). Volunteer teachers are also needed for our Catholic school. We are taking over the Eucharistic ministry of two convalescent hospitals and help is needed. We are adding a special music group to enhance our music program and to give the present choirs a much needed break. Our grounds and buildings need workers and finances. We will be placing a new coffee room and an adult education center in our fireplace room.

Sacrificial Giving



There are four fundamental principles to sacrificial giving:

- Principle 1) Give back to God in a spirit of grateful dependence in a spirit of grateful dependence a portion of everything that our Maker has given us.
- Principle 2) See that the gift is sacrifice , an offering within the Church services that makes holy all efforts and earnings of the past week.
- Principle 3) Use regularly the parish envelopes or your credit card for the sacrificial gifts.
- Principle 4) Look to the biblical concept of tithing as a barometer, guideline, norm, measuring rod of estimating level determining the amount of your sacrificial gift.
- Americans on an average contribute to church and charity, not church alone, from a low of 1.1 percent to a high of 3.2 percent. Interestingly, the persons with below poverty level incomes donate 2.7 percent.
- Percentage wise among denominations, Latter Day Saints top the list at nearly 7 percent, Baptist in the middle at about 2.5 percent and Catholics at the bottom with approximately 1.2 percent.
- Many members of the parish give away more than the Catholic average. Now as we move closer to Commitment Sunday we are inviting you to look back at your giving history. Has it remained the same for many years? Has your circumstances changed that you might need to lower or raise your donation.

Discernment Opportunity

We each have precious gifts of time, talent and treasure. Are we free enough to give them away—to share with others? Now is the time to discern how you and your family are called to support the Church. Take some time together this week and come to an agreement as to how you can serve the parish with time and talent? Can you give the one hour a month Fr. Mike asked for? Do you have a talent or professional skill—such as painter, plumber, electrician or musician that could move our parish forward and save some money at the same time?
