NAMESAKES OF CHRIST

On Palm Sunday we heard in Paul’s letter to the Philippians that all things in heaven, on earth, and under the earth must bend their knee at the name of Jesus. That name comes back in today’s first reading. The Sanhedrin, whom we heard about just a few short weeks ago in the reading of the Passion, are again confronted by Jesus in his name being proclaimed by the apostles. Peter and the others refuse to bend their knee to the authority of the Sanhedrin and stop teaching in the name of Christ. In fact, they rejoice that they have been persecuted for doing so.

Do we turn to those first brave followers when we are called upon to give witness to the name of Christ in our name “Christian” day by day? When we must stand against, challenge, or confront forces that counter the gospel of justice, peace, joy, and beauty, do we give witness with no less than the Holy Spirit, or do we remain silent? Do we genuinely give honor to the name of Jesus by being his namesakes in the world today?

**THE GREAT 50 DAYS OF EASTER**

The Acts of the Apostles forms one literary unit with the Gospel According to Luke. Luke's Gospel begins, "Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us...I too have decided...to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received" (Luke 1L1-4). Acts begins, "in the first book, Theophilus, I dealt with all that Jesus did and taught until the day he was taken up, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen" (Acts 1:1-2).



Luke/Acts is a very special form of writing. The author wants to show how the life and deeds of Jesus are continued in the life and deeds of the first disciples and are to be continued in the Church of our day. In the Gospel Jesus heals the sick; in Acts Peter does the same. In the gospel Jesus is brought before the high priest to be interrogated; in Acts the same thing happens to Peter. The death of Stephen, the first martyr, parallels the death of Jesus. Stephen prays, "Lord, do not hold their sin against them" (Acts 7:60) just as Jesus had prayed, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do" (Luke 23:46).

A good way to enter into the spirit of this season is to read Acts on your own. If you begin at Easter and read but four chapters a week--about a page a day--you will complete the entire book during the Easter season.

As we read the Acts of the Apostles and here the book proclaimed at each Mass during this season, we ask ourselves: Is this our Church? Are we a healing Church? Are we a forgiving Church? Do we struggle to follow the inspiration of the Spirit?

This is the message of the Great 50 Days: Rediscover our roots. According to Acts, our questions are not; Does our Church have the most members? Does our Church have the most money? Does our Church have the most elaborate rituals? The bottom line is: Does our Church continue the saving, healing, redeeming work of Christ?

The stories we read in Acts are not ancient anecdotes, mere memories in the family album. They are our story, our family picture. Today, Jesus must rise in us. Today, Jesus heals and reconciles through us. Today, we must keep the story alive!

# Our Graduates Speak for Themselves

When I was a young girl in 7th grade at St Joseph's School, the last place that I wanted to be was in a Catholic school. I remember changing my clothes immediately after school because wearing a uniform in public was embarrassing, to say the least. Luckily for me, my Dad ignored my pleas to follow some of my classmates that were leaving to go to the local junior high. After graduating from 8<sup>th</sup> grade and then Placer High School, I attended CSU Chico. While at Chico, I earned a Bachelor's Degree in Science and became a Registered Nurse. Today, I work in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Mercy San Juan Hospital. The high level of expectation that was set for me at St Joseph's laid a foundation that I believe helped me to be successful in a very competitive nursing program.

As an alumni of our school and as a parent of a 3<sup>rd</sup> grade student and a Kindergarten student here at St Joseph's School, it is much easier to look back and see that all of the dedication and encouragement from the school helped prepare me for my work life and faith life as an adult. I remember many frustrating and challenging times of sitting out on the bench for being disrespectful. However, I also remember coming together as a school and praying for a teacher's sick newborn. I will always remember the teacher who looked at me one day and said that he predicted that someday I would become a missionary. I often wonder if that was the seed that was planted that led me to be a nurse. Recently I thanked my Dad for sending me to St Joseph's. My husband, Kyle, is currently going through RCIA. His decision to join RCIA was, in part, influenced by the many faithful families we have met here at St Joseph's School. For our family, St. Joseph's Catholic School will always be a special place.
