
Baptisms: For the celebration of Baptism, please call the Parish Office, for information.

[I]n one Spirit we were all baptized into one body.

— 1 Corinthians 12:13a

COME, HOLY SPIRIT

When we hear “Come, Holy Spirit” we think of today’s story from Acts. But the truth is that today’s scene is but one moment from the Spirit’s long presence in salvation. The spirit of God (*ruach*) is present at the dawn of creation, blowing over the chaotic waters as God commands light to be. That same spirit of God filled the prophets of Israel. “The spirit of the Lord came upon me” fills their witness, as they guided Israel in their quest to be faithful to the loving, merciful God of their covenant. We hear that the Spirit overshadowed Mary’s womb so that the very Word of God would take on our human flesh. And Jesus begins his ministry in Luke’s Gospel by saying the Spirit is upon him. On the cross, according to John, he gives up his spirit. Today Paul tells us that this Holy Spirit is from God, who raised Christ from the dead. We also hear John’s account of the Spirit as the very breath of the risen Christ on his disciples.

That same Spirit of all these biblical accounts was there at our baptism and continues to live in us. We are temples of that Spirit, witnesses to the Spirit’s grace. And it is in the Holy Spirit that we will continue to live in the gospel’s light, and to pursue our life of eternal glory in Christ.

PENTECOST

God can only do so much with us as individuals, but can do so much more with us as a community or parish. Christ called his apostles individually but soon formed community especially with meals shared together in the evening time. It was during these evening meals that the apostles asked Jesus the deeper meaning of his parables and his teachings.

Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection revealed to mankind the depth of God's Love for all of us. His forty days with the apostles after the Resurrection strengthened their faith in Christ as the Messiah. It was now

their turn to teach and live the Good News of the fullness of life that God offers. Christ told them that he would send the Holy Spirit who would teach them everything and remind them of all that he taught them (Jn 14:26).

After the Ascension, the apostles left the Mt. of Olives and went back to Jerusalem. The apostles joined in continuous prayer with Mary the Mother of Jesus. On Pentecost they received the gifts of the Holy Spirit and were compelled to witness to the truth of Christ. The Lord wanted more from his apostles than a comfortable spiritual existence. With Pentecost they also knew that they were Spirit driven to share Christ's message.

It is within community that we receive the fullness of God's Presence and Love. It is also within community that we are continuously nourished and inspired to go forth and bring the Good News to our worlds. We are limited by our own resources, but as a truly welcoming and loving parish, God can work marvels.

LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION

Hospitality in Hebrew and Christian Scriptures

The story of Abraham and Sarah and the guests they welcomed into their home is the quintessential example of a hospitality story from the Old Testament: travelers arrive without warning; they are welcomed and given something to eat and drink, often the best the household has to offer; the travelers' true identity as angels or messengers from God is revealed. What is clear in this story is that the hospitality was not seen as optional; it was practical requirement among a nomadic people whose tent may be the only source of food and water for a fellow sojourner. And it was also an ethical requirement; as the Israelite nation matured, its law made clear that the stranger is to be welcomed as the Lord would be welcomed (Leviticus 19:34) The generosity of God's treatment of the Israelites when they were strangers in Egypt and travelers for forty years in the desert is seen as the measure of the hospitality that God's chosen ones are to show to others. In the Old Testament we find not simply hospitality but extravagant hospitality as an ethnical imperative.

These ideas are echoed in the New Testament. At first glance it may look as though Jesus is teaching his disciples basic manners in the account that appears in Luke 14: "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited".

When you hold a lunch or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or your wealthy neighbors, in case they may invite you back and you have repayment. Rather, when you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; blessed indeed will you be because of their inability to repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

In these verses Jesus is setting out the basics of Christian hospitality; that it is often set within the context of a meal, source of life and sign of intimacy; and that it requires that we invite those who are perceived as "other" to join us. It is not enough to simply be generous to those around us; we must invite those who cannot give back in return and do so in such a way that they are not obligated to return in kind.

So, what does hospitality look like in our adult, evangelizing parish? On the one hand, we are called to make hospitality more than simply something we do; gather Thanksgiving baskets or support the Interfaith Food Closet. These are fine and important signs of hospitality, but what is called for is more of a habit or stance of hospitality. Essential to this is the creation of a welcoming and hospitable space. It is also crucial that we recognize who the "other" is to this community; a fundamental way of doing this is by looking around and asking "Who is not present in our gatherings? Or "Who is always at the periphery of parish life?" As we honestly respond to these questions, we are called to engage in the hospitality that welcomes the stranger and those who are cast off from our social context. This is the beginning of Christian hospitality.
