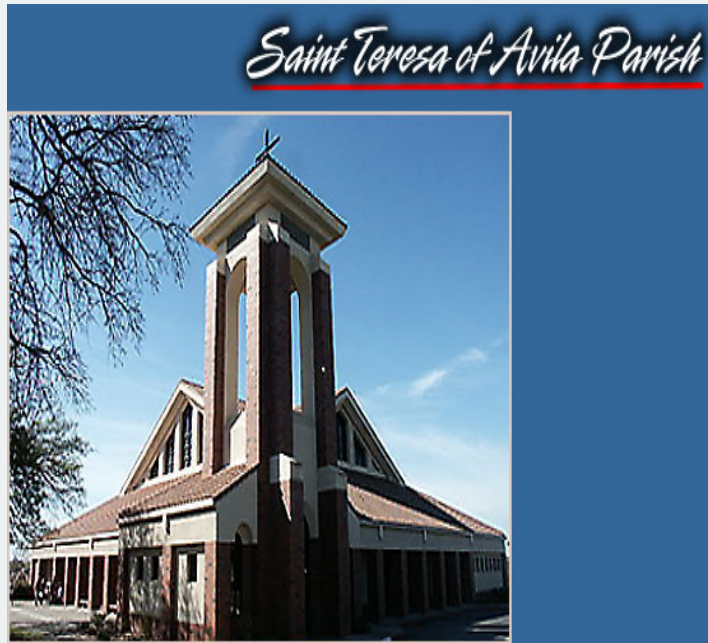

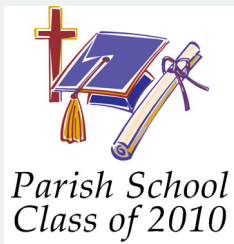

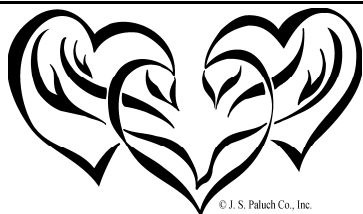

**PRAISE TO THE CREATOR**

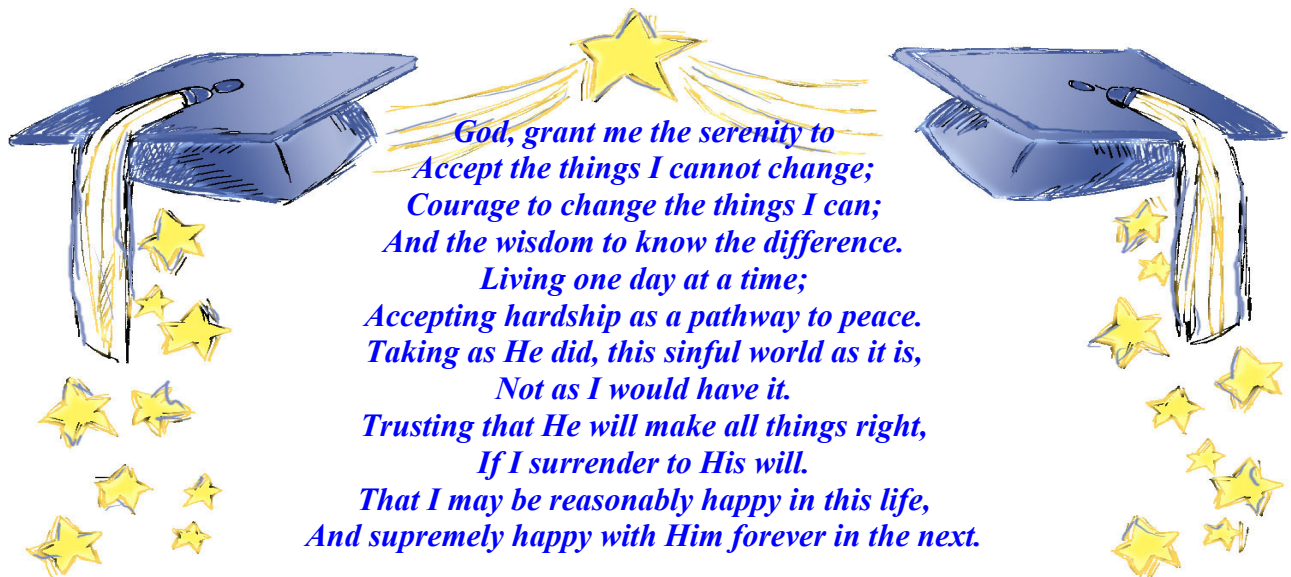


PRAYER FOR GRADUATES

## **LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION CONVERSATION**

Like hospitality, “conversation” is a term used in contemporary culture to indicate a wide variety of experiences. The phrase “national conversation on health care,” for example, refers to everything from heated disputes and political bargaining that have dominated the news media as well as the all too infrequent reasoned presentation or lecture that attempts to provide a more balanced account of the issues.

“Conversation” can refer to the day-to-day interchanges that people have at home and at work. Often referred to as “discussion” the exchange of ideas at a meeting at times sounds more like sequential monologues than conversation. And the desultory chat among parents as they wait to pick up their children at the end of a school day passes the time but is easily forgotten. So debates, arguments, discussions, and chats may all have the designation “conversation” but for the sake of this essay, a more focused understanding of the term is helpful and important.

As portrayed in the Gospel, Jesus was a great one for conversation. The story of Jesus’ encounter with the rich young man (Mark 10:17-22) is a good example of the kind of conversations that Jesus had with all types of people.

The story begins at the initiation of the rich young man; perhaps he was a “seeker”. Or perhaps he was trying to justify his lifestyle or check to be sure that he has done what’s needed to get to heaven. Jesus’ response seems a bit terse: “You know the commandments...,” he said. And then went on to name the basics. The rich man agreed and said that he had been following these all his life. The evangelist Mark then wrote:

“Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, ‘You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.’ At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions.”

And in this interchange we have indication of conversation: both parties spoke, both parties listened, and the outcome only came clear in the exchange. Neither Jesus nor the rich man knew where the conversation was going to go when it began. And we don’t know how it finally ended: Did the rich man come back and talk further with Jesus? Did he become one of his followers later, or one of the earlier believers following the events of Pentecost? We just don’t know. That is the nature of genuine conversation: it continues on in the minds and hearts of the participants long after the verbal exchange is over.

**I contend that one of the most important dimensions of an adult church is the capacity to engage in sustained, critical conversation.** It is primarily in the context of conversation with other adults about things that matter that adult faith is nourished and strengthened.

Engaging in sustained, critical conversation has many positive effects that strengthen the parish’s capacity to be evangelizing. It enhances our ability to express our faith; we often come to clarity about what we think and believe by talking with others. **Conversation provides a context for making the connection between faith and life; hearing how other people live lives of hope and faith can strengthen our own.** Engaging in sustained critical conversation also helps us to recognize pluralism within our faith community and gives us the means for communication across differences,. Finally, conversation across time allows believers to set beliefs outside themselves and to examine them critically. We are able to ask: Is this what I really believe? Why do I believe this? What are the implications of this belief for how I live my life, raise my children, and make decisions? Exploring these questions is essential to the formation of adult, evangelizing faith.
