Christ Jesus emptied himself,
taking the form of a slave,
coming in human likeness.

— *Philippians 2:7*

BEING LIFTED UP

In today’s Gospel, Jesus reminds Nicodemus how Moses had “lifted up the serpent in the desert.” Then Jesus says, “So must the Son of Man be lifted up, that all who believe may have eternal life in him.” The evangelist clearly saw this “lifting up” of Jesus to mean his crucifixion.

That “lifting up” of the serpent by Moses is described in today’s first reading. The people were attacked by “saraph serpents,” and many died. God had Moses make an image of the serpent and put it on a pole and lift it up. The people who had been bitten looked at it and recovered.

Jesus “emptied himself, taking the form of a slave.” Lifted up on the cross, he was despised and seemed the most abject of people. But it was in embracing this disgrace and painful death that he became the bearer of eternal life for all of us. His “lifting up” in shame was also his “lifting up” in glory and triumph.

Psalm — Do not forget the works of the Lord! (Psalm 78).

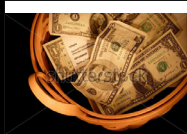
Second Reading — Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped (Philippians 2:6-11).

GOD BLESS AMERICA

Today, on the eve of 9-11, I celebrated our school Mass for those who died thirteen years ago when our country was attacked. When people were loosing their lives, their fellow citizens rather than run away were walking towards them. As Americans and as followers of Christ, we cannot walk by on the other side of the road and pretend not to see.

Two years after 9-11-2001, I saw Ted Coppel interview Bruce Springsteen on Nightline. He asked the singer why did he keep using religious terminology in his CD "Rising". Springsteen answered, "I was raised Catholic and it is the language that helps me to express the depths of feelings and ideas that surround this tragedy. The song writer said he heard people on television say as they were leaving the World Trade Center, "The firemen were ascending as we were descending." Springsteen said, "They ascended to more than the flames They ascended to God, they ascended to Love and Duty.

*"Up the stairs, into the fire
I need you near,
But love and duty called me
Someplace higher, somewhere up there*

*May your Strength — Give us Strength
May your Faith — Give us Faith
May your Hope — Give us Hope
May your Love — Give us Love"*

("Rising"—Bruce Springsteen)

The first reading at today's school Mass spoke about the end of the world being near. What would we do if we knew time was running out for us. Should we not like St. Theresa of Lisieux say "I would continue what I do everyday." Be that taking care of our families, loved ones, customers, parishioners and God's creation.

9-11-2001 helped us put our values in right order. God and our loved ones were put back on the top of our priority lists. Since those days, thirteen years ago, all of us have slipped back to non American and non Christian ways. To rectify this we need to look at what we can be with the grace of God. Like the fire personnel, we go towards the problem, not away from it. When we seen somebody hurting, we do not pretend not to see, we go towards them. President Dwight D. Eisenhower told us as a nation not to get caught up in just having good times, **"A people that values its privileges above it's principles, soon loses both."**

Tonight, as I write this note, on the eve of 9-11, President, Barack Obama, will address our nation. Let us pray for him and our congress, let us live lives of service and most of all let us appreciate and pray for those military personnel, diplomats, and fellow citizens who paid the ultimate price to make our world safer.

SER LEVANTADOS

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús le recuerda a Nicodemo cómo Moisés había “levantado la serpiente en el desierto”. Entonces dice Jesús, “así también es necesario que el Hijo del Hombre sea levantado en alto, para que todo aquel que crea tenga por él vida eterna”. El evangelista claramente da a entender que este “ser levantado” de Jesús se refiere a su crucifixión.

La serpiente que Moisés “levantó” está descrita en la primera lectura de hoy. El pueblo fue atacado por “serpientes de las llamadas ‘ardientes’”, y muchos murieron. Dios dijo a Moisés que hiciera una imagen de la serpiente y la pusiera en un palo y la levantara. Si alguno era mordido, miraba a la serpiente y se recuperaba.

Jesús se “despojó de sí mismo, tomando la forma de un esclavo”. Levantado en la cruz, fue escarnecido y parecía el más despreciable de todos. Pero fue abrazando esta deshonrosa y penosa muerte que llegó a ser el portador de la vida eterna para todos nosotros. Al ser “levantado” cubierto de vergüenza fue también “levantado” glorioso y triunfante.
