**HEALING MINISTRY**

During Jesus' ministry "he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons." This is the case in today's Gospel. Jesus fulfills the vision of Psalm 147: "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds."

Jesus knew, however, that he couldn't possibly heal all the illness in the world. No matter how many people he cured or how many hours he ministered, there always would be more suffering people like Job who craved his healing touch. His primary mission was not to rid the world of all suffering. His "purpose" was to preach the coming of the reign of God that heals, yes, but ultimately transcends and transforms earthly suffering. With Paul, Jesus could have said, "Woe to me if I do not preach" that good news.

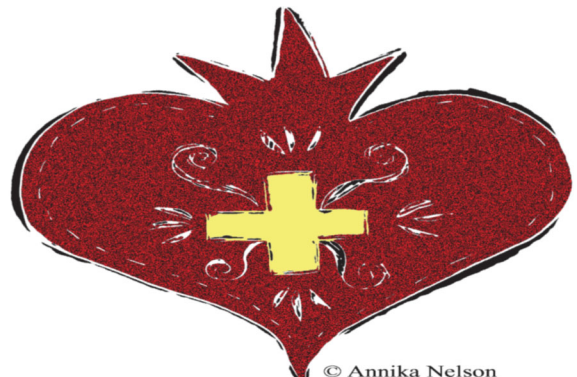

**BLESSINGS**

As priests and deacons we are asked to bless homes, business places, sacred objects and above all people. A blessing that I loved to get was from my aunt who lived in our ancestral home. She would always run inside, get the Holy Water and sprinkle me saying “A special blessing from your mother, grandparents and all who ever lived here, in the name of the Father, in the name of the Son, and in the name of the Holy Ghost, Amen”.

The source from whom every good gift comes is God, Who is above all, blessed forever. He who is all good has made all things good, so that He might fill His creatures with blessings. Even after the fall of mankind He has continued His blessings as a sign of His merciful love. In the fullness of time, God the Father sent His only Son, and through Him there is a new gift in every spiritual blessing. After His Death, Resurrection and Ascension, Christ sent the gift of the Holy Spirit on those called to new life. As members of Christ’s Body we are to spread the fruits of the same Spirit in order to bring God’s healing blessings to the world. “For well—disposed members of the faithful, the liturgy of Sacramentals sanctifies almost every event of their lives with the Divine Grace which flows from the Paschal mystery. From this source, Sacraments and Sacramentals draw their power. There is scarcely any proper use of material things which cannot be thus directed toward the sanctification of people and the praise of God. (Catechism -1670). The Church also asks that the celebration of the blessing of things or places according to custom, should not take place without the participation of at least some of the faithful.

As priests we bless homes, automobiles, places of business, sacred objects and people, where time permits. It is a beautiful reminder to us that God blesses us and that all things can sanctify and give glory to God.

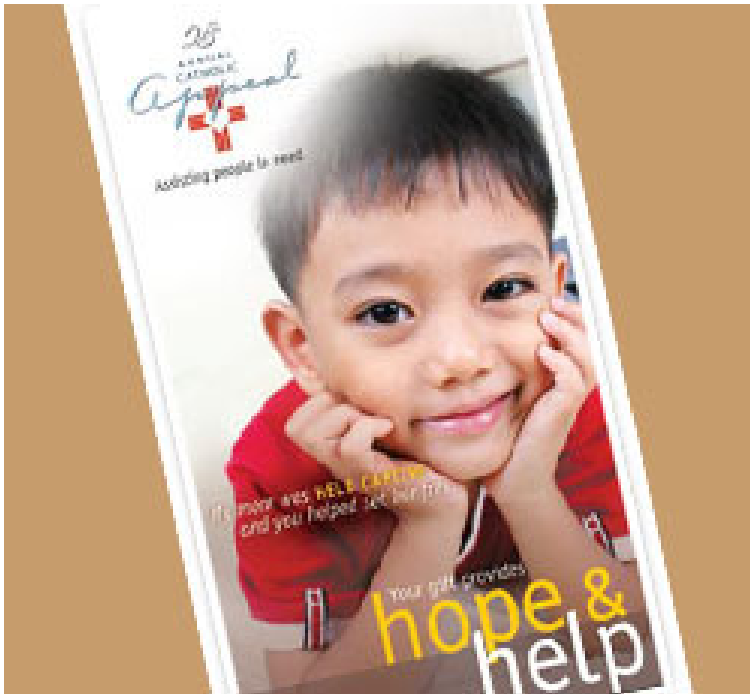
